WHY LEARN CHINESE?

I've decided to start learning Mandarin as I have 2 Chinese clients. Therefore, I needed and wanted to make an effort to understand them both linguistically and culturally. During my travels, I found that even if you only know the basics of a language it does make a big difference. In the past British people have had a poor reputation for learning other languages, though this has changed more recently. On the contrary, I have always pushed myself to learn new languages and this has been a great motivation for myself.

3 TIPS FOR CHINESE LEARNERS

- Take your time: learning a language is an ongoing process that may require a long time. You need to allow yourself enough time as results may not necessarily be visible after only a few months. However, if you are committed to learning you will soon see the benefits of it.
- Exercise daily: foreing languages may be easy to forget if you don't practice daily. A good way of keeping up with your linguistic knowledge is to learn something new every day. Even learning a few new words or sentences can make all the difference in the long term.
