Current Research Areas

Apprenticeship and Training in Pre-Industrial Europe

This project aims to produce a new economic history of the largest institution for the production of human capital in the premodern economy: apprenticeship. Using very large new quantitative datasets and a wide range of qualitative sources, my work seeks to evaluate the contribution of formal institutions to the operation of apprenticeship as a source of human capital and uncover the actual practice of intergenerational human capital formation.

We examine the economic and social impact of apprenticeship, and evaluate apprenticeship's impact on the performance of the premodern economy and its subsequent industrialisation. Our findings show that in practice apprenticeship operated in ways that are completely unanticipated in the existing literature: this was an open, fluid institution in early modern England.

Citizenship in Pre-Modern Europe

I am studying what historical (urban) citizenship can tell us about how to solve problems in contemporary European citizenship. Funded by the EU, this research contributes to a dialogue between historians and other social scientists on the nature of citizenship.

The Commercialisation of Medicine in Pre-modern Europe

This project seeks to measure and explain the dramatic growth in supply and demand for commercial (market-based) medical provision in early modern Europe: simply put, I am examining the rise of medical practitioners as a commonplace source of support during ill health. My current work focuses on measures of supply, including the first detailed evidence of the scale of the trade in imported medicinal drugs from 1550-1800, and new estimates for individual demand for medical care during times of serious illness from 1650-1800.
