How children visualise cities of today and tomorrow

How do children see urban inequalities and the transformation of cities? What would they change in their neighbourhoods? What kind of cities do they wish for? *periferias dibujadas* is an ongoing project that works collaboratively with other groups to create spaces for children in different places across Europe to research, narrate and intervene in their urban contexts. The children's images explore issues affecting cities today, such as access to housing, racism, gentrification and the impact of tourism, and show their visions for more liveable and just cities.

Using modes of expression that are accessible to children can help us better understand urban transformation and demonstrates the importance of multiple forms of knowledge.
