On 11 September 1973, a military coup overthrew Chile's democratically elected government and ushered forth a violent right-wing dictatorship. In the months and years that followed, Chile became a focus of worldwide mobilisation in solidarity with those resisting the dictatorship. In Britain, politicians, trade unionists, students, women's rights movements, religious groups and journalists protested human rights abuses in Chile, often linking what was happening in Chile to politics and society at home. They shaped a new global human rights movement and new forms of resistance. Exiled Chileans in the UK contributed to this mobilisation. They also contributed immensely to British political, cultural and economic life. Exiles in the UK built families, inspired activism and encouraged their British counterparts to fight for democratic freedoms at home and abroad.

Fifty years after the Chilean coup, the Department of International History at the LSE is hosting a conference to reflect on British responses to events in Chile and more specifically the impact that the coup had on politics, society and culture in the UK. Conference participants will also be encouraged to engage with the lessons that this relationship can offer for thinking through resistance, human rights and refuge in the present.

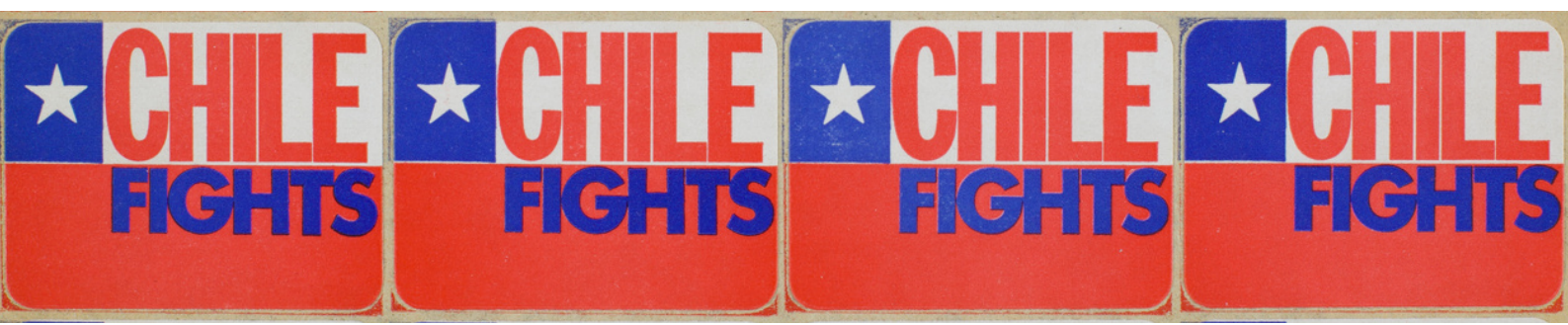
