“A set of shared values, beliefs and practices that are influenced by the environment and transmitted to others”

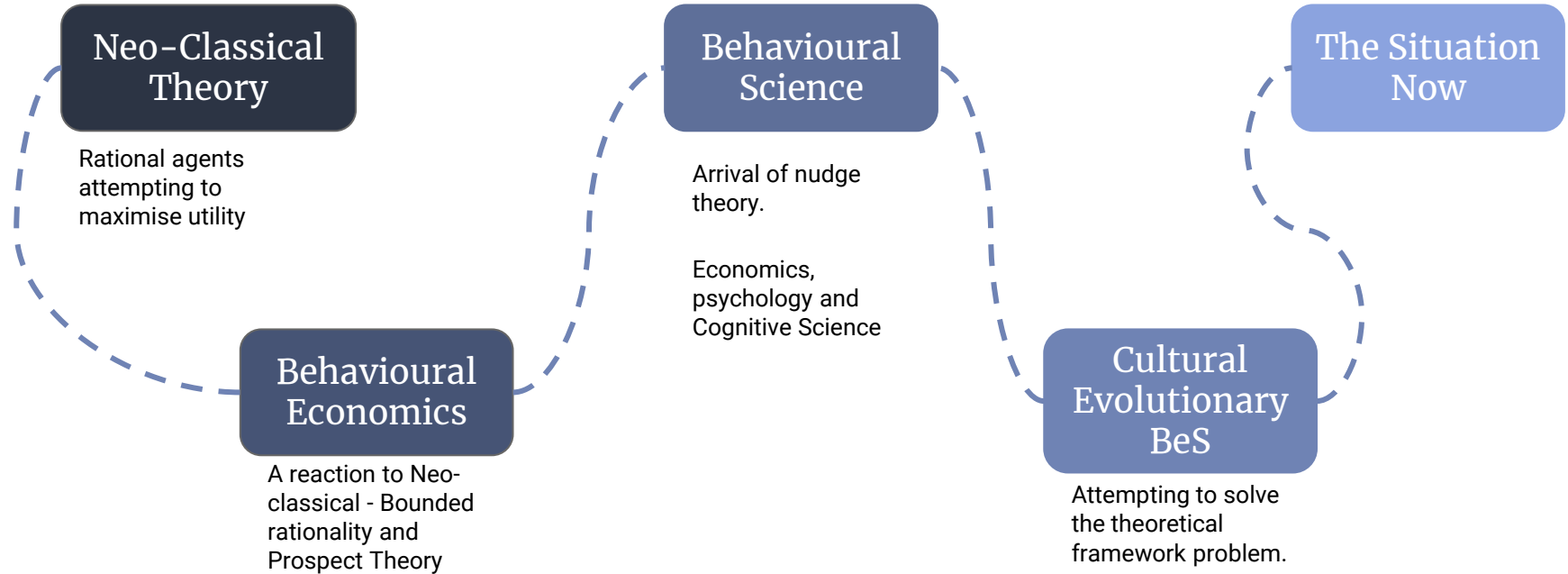

Culture like language requires translation in order to be understood in terms of another culture

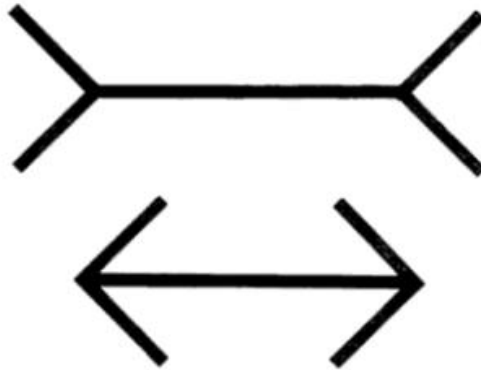
Culture is characterised by individual private thoughts (beliefs) and public behaviours (practices) if they are (1) affected by environment, (2) shared by a group and (3) transmitted to new members.

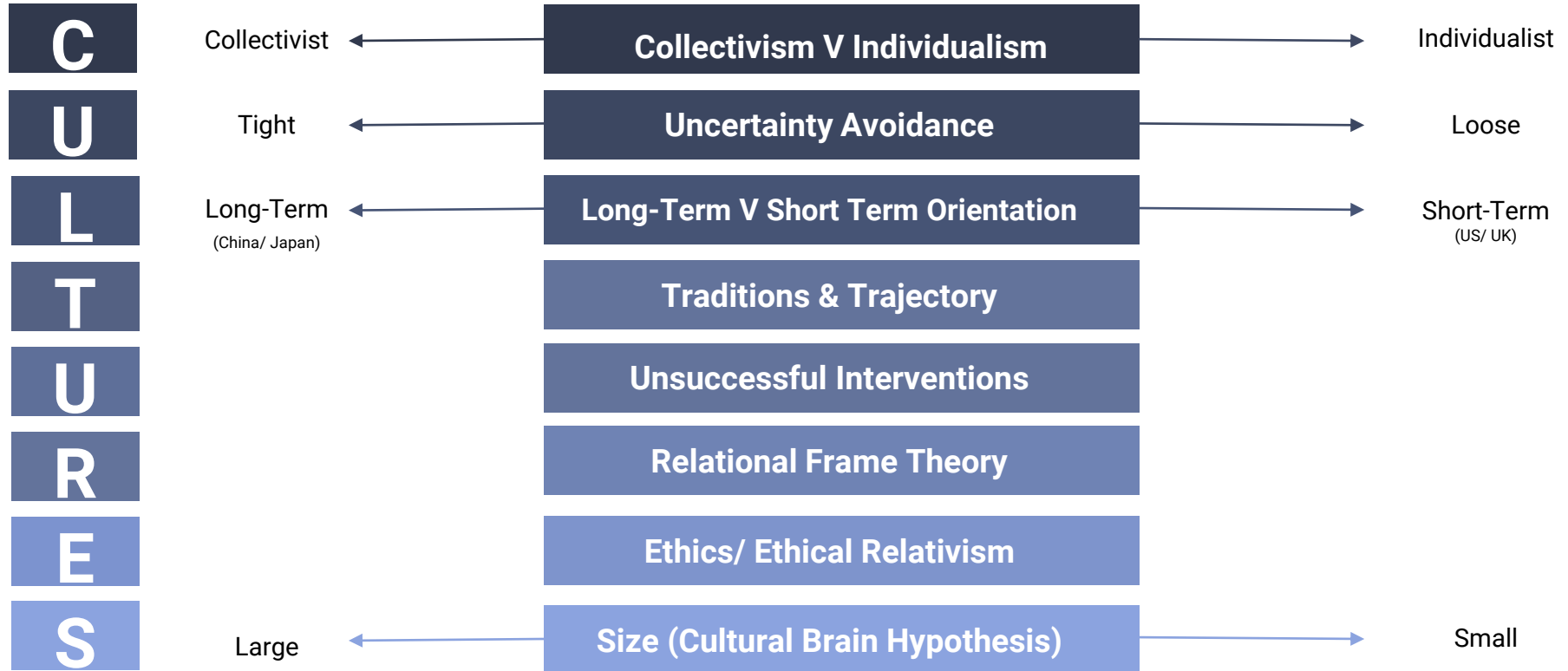

Long-Term Ideology: A Cultural Relativist Approach

01

BS is fundamentally WEIRD

- BS is a western discipline (Econ, psychology, social science)
- Our database draws from an extremely narrow slice of human diversity (American Undergrads)
- We assume that these findings generalise to other populations



ANSWER: A DECOLONIAL APPROACH TO BS

LONGER TERM HORIZONS - As a discipline we should offering to teach other (non-WEIRD) cultures the tools from behavioural science and allow them to develop the discipline as they see fit within their own culture. Otherwise it is just another example of imperialism and the 'white saviour'.

BENEFITS: (1) Diversity (2) Decoloniality (3) Respect and reciprocity
